LUCKY'S JOURNEY: FROM TRAPPED TO FINDING HIS FOREVER HOME

It was a crisp morning when NOCO Humane's Animal Protection & Control team received a call through dispatch about a cat in a precarious situation. A young orange tabby was trapped in the engine of a parked car, his front left leg painfully caught in one of the engine belts. Officer Kayley McMurray arrived first on the scene and quickly realized the severity of the situation. Unable to free the cat on her own, she called for backup, and Officer Sydney Robinson arrived to assist. With one officer reaching down into the engine and the other reaching from the ground below, they worked in tandem with meticulous effort to help the trapped cat.

After what felt like an eternity, the team managed to disentangle the distressed cat from the engine belt. Despite the victory, this feline's fight was just beginning. There was no question that the cat needed urgent medical care. Without hesitation, Officer McMurray rushed him to NOCO Humane's Larimer Campus, where the Veterinary Services Team was ready to act. Time was of the essence—Lucky, as he would soon be named, had lost a significant amount of blood from a ruptured vein underneath his arm, and his little body was weakening. Shelter Veterinarian Dr. Slayter quickly assessed the situation. "We knew early on that the best way to avoid complications down the road, and to ensure a quicker path to an enjoyable life, would be to amputate his leg," Dr. Slayter explained.



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The team worked quickly to stabilize Lucky, administering fluids and pain medication while preparing him for surgery. However, another challenge soon arose—Lucky tested positive for FIV, a feline immunodeficiency virus that could complicate his recovery. Coupled with his severe blood loss, there were concerns about how well he would fare under anesthesia. With the clock ticking and no promising alternatives, Dr. Slayter and her team decided to push forward with surgery.

While carefully monitoring Lucky's blood pressure, Dr. Slayter worked quickly to amputate the mangled limb. In only 45 minutes, the hemorrhage had slown, the limb was removed, and Lucky was being cleaned and bandaged. He had survived the surgery, but Dr. Slayter knew that a full recovery was not guaranteed.

Lucky spent two weeks being closely monitored by the Veterinary Services team. While his bandages needed changing and his pain had to be managed, staff were most concerned about any indication that Lucky's FIV diagnosis could be hindering his recovery. That's why, when his incision site began showing signs of infection, Lucky was immediately brought back to the surgery table. Undeterred, Dr. Slayter performed a second procedure to debride the incision site - a simple surgery in which the wound is deeply cleaned, and any dead tissue is removed to ensure proper healing. "After that," shared Dr. Slayter, "he was looking great." It seemed that Lucky was out of the woods. Now, all he needed was time to heal and restore his strength.

That's when Adele, one of NOCO Humane's Foster Care

Volunteers, stepped in to offer Lucky a quiet place to recover. "He was such a happy boy and so loving for what he had been through," she said fondly. For two weeks, Lucky rested in Adele's home, slowly regaining his strength and proving his resilience. "This was my first time caring for a three-legged animal," said Adele. "I wasn't sure how he would get around, but it seemed like he didn't even notice he's missing a leg. He loved being with my children and giving them endless kisses."

Once his incision healed and his energy returned, Lucky came back to the shelter for a final check-up. Dr. Slayter gave him a clean bill of health, and Lucky was officially ready for adoption.

The very next day, Lucky's new family found him. Kate, who had driven 40 miles from Thornton with her family, knew Lucky was meant to be theirs the moment she saw him on the website. "I'm very drawn to an animal with a story, with a challenge," Kate shared. When they met Lucky in person, it was love at first sight.

As they finalized the adoption, Kate decided to rename him "Cheese." "All our animals are named after food, and being an orange cat, he's just a little Cheese," Kate laughed. "My mom told me I couldn't name a cat 'Cheese,' so our family got a giggle out of doing it anyway. He's so cute—there's just not enough Cheese to go around!"

Lucky, now Cheese, has settled into his new home beautifully. He's become best friends with his new furry sibling, Mousse, and his new veterinarian has no concerns about his health. From a harrowing rescue to a loving forever family, Lucky's story is one of courage, resilience, and second chances.


